**SEPTEMBER 18 2023** 

A meeting of the Council of the Township of Enniskillen was held on Monday September 18 at 7:00 pm at the Enniskillen Council Chambers.

Mayor Marriott chaired the meeting.

## **Pecuniary Interest**

Mayor Marriott requested that each member of Council declare an interest at the appropriate time within the agenda where an interest may exist.

#### A. Minutes

That the minutes of the meeting of September 5 2023 be adopted as circulated. Carried.

B. Compass Energy- Energy Storage Project- 7pm Present: James Marzotto

Mr. Marzotto reported to Council that the capacity of the electrical system in Concession 14 had provided this day and it had been determined that there was not sufficient capacity to permit additional electricity. As a result, Compass Energy was no longer pursing their energy storage project.

## Minutes of Gorman Park site meeting

Councillor Krall read the minutes to the site meeting provided by the Drainage Superintendent. Property owners who expressed concern about back yard flooding were directed to make use of the drainage outlets provided to their properties. Alternatively, they could submit a petition under the Drainage Act to address drainage.

Councillor Krall noted that the site meeting discussed the installation of two catch basins connected to the park tile system at the east end of both Keating and McMillian Street.

## I. Bylaws

Councillor McCallum questioned why there had not been agricultural grant applied to farm properties on the Gurd Drains.

Moved by Councillor Van Dun Seconded by Councillor Krall That first and second reading be given to Bylaws 50 and 52 of 2023. Carried.

Moved by Councillor McCallum Seconded by Councillor Van Dun That third and final reading be given to Bylaws 50 and 52 of 2023. Carried.

A break was taken until the County Planner arrived at the meeting.

Mayor Marriott requested that Mr. Melanson provide a report to Council of the status of the bylaws presented to regulate cannabis growing in the Township. Mr. Melanson noted that the Council had tabled discussion on the site-specific zoning bylaw for Enniskillen Pepper.

Councillor Krall asked whether the site specific bylaw could be amended to include regulations dealing with noise, odour and lights.

Mr. Melanson referred to the Pelham bylaw which he noted had included site specific provisions to address these matters.

Councillor Krall questioned whether there was any way to obtain common ground on the bylaws.

Mr. Melanson noted that the passage of the cannabis policies and associated bylaws would lead to a hearing at the Ontario Land Tribunal.

Councillor McCallum questioned about the site plan agreement affecting the Enniskillen Pepper property.

Mr. Melanson noted that the schedule to the site plan agreement had lapsed.

Councillor Van Dun questioned the Clerk as to whether any person had requested to speak to the Council on the cannabis bylaw.

The Clerk noted that Mr. Brand's lawyer had requested that the Council advertise a public meeting under the provisions of the Planning Act to provide an opportunity for people to comment on the site-specific bylaw.

Mr. Melanson noted that Mr. Brand had been effective in attracting people from the community to attend Council meetings to listen to the discussion regarding the cannabis bylaws.

He noted it would be up to Council whether to proceed to re-advertise for an additional public meeting.

Councillor Van Dun put a motion forward to adopt the site-specific bylaw but there was no seconder.

Councillor Krall recommended that the site-specific bylaw be amended to include additional provisions related to odour, noise and lights.

Anthony Petrucci questioned what is new in the proposed amendments to the site-specific bylaw.

Mr. Melanson commented that the issue of odour from a licensed cannabis facility is within federal jurisdiction.

Councillor McCallum questioned whether the federal government would participate in an Ontario Land Tribunal hearing.

Mr. Melanson noted that Council could approve the site-specific bylaw without amendment or approve with changes.

Mr. Melanson noted that the current appeal of the general cannabis bylaw to the Ontario Land Tribunal would place a hold on the process until it was settled.

Moved by Councillor Krall Seconded by Councillor McCallum That Bylaw 51 of 2023 be denied. Motioned failed.

Councillor Van Dun put forward a motion to approve Bylaw 51 of 2023 but the motion was not seconded.
